
Please remember that if the Vanderburgh School System cancels school due to weather on the day we have a meeting scheduled, our meeting will be canceled as well.

PRESIDENT'S CORNER:





JANUARY MINI SEMINAR:

This month we will carve a bear holding a heart. Cut outs will be supplied. You will find pictures and information for the project below. This project can be modified for the bear to be holding different objects quite easily. At 5pm Jack will demonstrate the process of making a cutout for this project on a small bandsaw, for those that are interested.



Project pattern above.



Cutouts will be supplied.

Mark the major features as in picture below.

Use a V tool to outline these features as in the next picture.

Use a knife to shape head and body.

Finish out details and paint.



BONUS PROJECT:

The week before Christmas I was asked if I had any Grinch carvings to sell. I did not but I asked what she was looking for. She wanted a Grinch for her granddaughter that could set on a shelf in her room. I did a little research and did not find anything that caught my interest until I saw a scroll saw project of a Grinch shelf setter that used cord for legs. The following is my take on this project as a carving. I sketched out a pattern for the body, included below, and cut it out of a 2"X2" block. I wanted the head to be movable so I drilled a 1/2" hole in the top of the body block and cut a 1/2" round tenon on the bottom of a 1.5"X1.5" block. I carved the Grinch's head on the corner of the 1.5"X1.5" block. The boots were sketched on a piece of ornament thickness wood and cut out on the bandsaw. The legs were red paracord with a 3/8" piece of electrical heat shrink tubing on each end. This helped keep the paracord from fraying and made it easier to insert and glue in holes drilled in the body and the top of the boots. Feel free to have a go at the project. Yell if you have any questions. OH, and yes, I got it carved, painted, and delivered in time.
